Pompeiiana membership now extends into 20 states, and we need only raise \$600 more before we are able to accept the \$5,000 discretionary grant from the Lilly Endowment in Indianapolis.

Spring will soon be approaching and once again young people's hearts will turn to catapulting. Thus, we have devoted a good portion of this newsletter to the national contest. We are already in receipt of our first entries for the Fourth National Catapult Contest and wish to remind Latin teachers planning to enter that entry blanks from the new guidelines must be mailed by the Ides of March, 1975.

It needs to be pointed out that a new heavyweight division was created this year, thereby causing the lightweight divisions to be relabelled. Last year's results given in the '75 guidelines are listed, however, according to the division labels as they existed last year (i.e., lightweight counterweight catapults labelled as Division F in 1974 results will be Division G in the 1975 contest, etc.)

As Spring is also a time when students begin selecting their courses for next year, Pompeiiana will publish a special issue of the newsletter in March which will feature testimonials and articles promoting the study of Latin at the secondary school level. The newsletter will be suitable for distribution among students and counsellors for recruitment purposes. Extra copies will be available at cost.


The principal had the spear bronzed and presented it to the members of the crew at the school's Awards Day program.


