
"Fidem meam obligo vixillo

And so the day begins for the Latin students of Bernard Szymczak at Anoka Senior High School, Anoka, Minnesota.

Bernard Szymczak, former member of the National JCL Committee, feels that Latin is a basic language. English prefixes and roots are based on it, and thousands of words in the English vocabulary are Latin words or derivatives. So, a knowledge of Latin could help one better understand and speak correct English. It's a part of our culture. There is Latin in law, science, art and music; it's in every phase of our education. Our cultural and civilization problems are the same as in the past, as is human nature, so Latin history and the humanities are as necessary to know as ever.

Szymczak and his students publish a newsletter regularly entitled ROMANITAS, which contains many interesting and

pertinent articles concerning Latin and history. Their Thanksgiving issue carried a typical menu in Latin. Also, the pin shown on the right is another example that Patriotism, as well as Latin, is alive and well in Anoka Senior High School, Anoka, Minnesota.


Pompeiiana has been awarded a discretionary grant from the Lilly Endowment in Indianapolis to conduct a feasibility study among area secondary schools to determine what type of Classical Studies programs these schools would like to see developed or preserved and how they would like Pompeiiana to help them in adapting Classical Studies to the students and curricula of the seventies.

In conjunction with the special edition newsletter entitled "Latin...Your Best Educational Investment," which you received recently, a set of slides and accompanying cassette tape have been prepared which circulate free of charge. It is a perfect complement for Language Day or Language Week programs.

Thirty-seven catapult teams are currently preparing for competition in seven states as they vie for awards and personal achievements in the Fourth National Catapult Contest. 
UVA GRUBBEA IN PRUNEPITUM SNIDLIUM VERSA


Pompeiiana was presented to the gathering as the product of "harsh necessity, of a recognition of the needs of the times, and of a long-held dream for the future."

The needs of the times require that the struggle for the survival of Latin at the secondary school level must be taken to the public at large by an organization independent of any one school system for its existence.

The goal of Pompeiiana, Inc. is to construct an accurate and partially renovated replica of the Pompeiian house of Marcus Loreius Tibertinus as an educational site for youth in America.


